RIGHT PLACE, RIGHT TIME

I want to thank BC Brett Graham and the crew of E-23 (Capt. Lawrence, FF Bustamante, FF Galster, and FF Saluni) for their life saving actions yesterday. BC Graham was the first emergency responder to the side of a teen age girl in cardiac arrest at La Center High School. He called for resources, retrieved his Automatic External Defibrillator (AED) and first aid kit, and initiated care. The La Center School District nurse began CPR while BC Graham set up the AED. The electrical shock delivered by the AED converted the patient from ventricle fibrillation to a life-sustaining heart rhythm. E-23 arrived shortly after and began Advanced Life Support care. Patient care was also provided by Capt. Galster and FF Chenoweth from Tower 29. Thanks to the quick actions of BC Graham and the care given by responding crews, the patient is alive and recovering from the incident. This incident points out the value of having citizens trained in CPR and an AED readily available in public locations.



CCF&R WELCOMES NEW TRT MEMBERS

CCF&R is a participating member of the County-wide Technical Rescue Team (TRT). The team has members from the Vancouver Fire Department, Clark County Fire District 6, and CCF&R. They respond throughout the county to unusual incidents such as confined space entrapment, structural collapses, trench collapses, and rope-rescue incidents. CCF&R has had three members on the team, and recently assigned three more. After an application and interview process, Captain David Greenwood, Firefighter Matt Akers, and Firefighter



Josh Brooks were selected to serve on the team. The new members were introduced to the TRT with a 40-hour rope rescue academy. They will continue to train and certify in other technical areas as the training with the team is available.

STATION 151 PUBLIC SAFETY COMPLEX OPEN HOUSE



CCF&R joined Clark County Fire District 6, the Clark County Fire Marshal's Office and the Clark County Sheriff's Office for an Open House on September 16th at our shared Fairgrounds Fire Facility (Station 151). Firefighter/Support Hieter and Firefighter/Support Zander from CCF&R provided Water Tender operations demonstrations, and Special Rescue 24 was on site with the rescue raft for display. CCFD#6 demonstrated heavy extrication by utilizing hydraulic tools to gain access to vehicles, while the Clark County FMO demonstrated the value of residential fire sprinklers with side-by-side fires in simulated structures. In

addition, a Life Flight helicopter made an appearance and CCSO provided multiple demonstrations of law enforcement capabilities and equipment. We were also joined by several community service organizations providing information and services to attendees.

FIRE STATION 29 NEARLY READY FOR CREWS



